A hard fork is a protocol upgrade that is not backward compatible. This means every node (computer connected to the Bitcoin network using a client that performs the task of validating and relaying transactions) needs to upgrade before the new blockchain with the hard fork activates and rejects any blocks or transactions from the old blockchain. The old blockchain will continue to exist and will continue to accept transactions, although it may be incompatible with other newer Bitcoin clients.

At the time of writing, we estimate that there are more than 2 million pairs being traded, made up of coins, tokens and projects in the global coin market. As mentioned above, we have a due diligence process that we apply to new coins before they are listed. This process controls how many of the cryptocurrencies from the global market are represented on our site.

Welch became famous after she was filmed by YouTube creators using the onomatopoeic phrase "hawk tuah" to describe a spitting action used in a sexual context. She has since transformed her newfound fame into a successful merchandise line and the podcast Tuah Talk, where she has interviewed musician Wiz Khalifa and Shark Talk investor Mark Cuban.

Following news of the closed investigation, the price of HAWK reportedly jumped by 25% on the decentralized exchange Meteora. Recent data shows the meme coin has a market cap of approximately \$4 million with \$333,000 in trading volume over a 24-hour period.

Haliey Welch, better known as Hawk Tuah Girl, is pretty much exclusively known for talking but has been silent for more than two weeks following the

collapse of the branded memecoin \$HAWK. Well, Welch is back—though not in front of a mic. Instead, she's issued a very lawyerly statement following the news that a class action lawsuit has been filed against the team responsible for \$HAWK and its unceremonious but extremely predictable crash.

"Unfortunately with situations like this, they're not targeting crypto bros, they're mostly targeting actual fans who have never been involved in the crypto space before," he said in a video viewed more than 1.4 million times.

"I hate to say this, but it was a much-needed mental health—just…what do you call it? A mental health break, I guess, is what you can call it," she told Vanity Fair. "I would see my friends. I would go out and eat. That's really about it. I don't ever get out and do much when I'm home. I like being by myself."

It addressed investors of Welch's coin in another post, writing: "If you lost money on \$HAWK, contact our firm to learn about your legal rights. Our firm represents thousands of nft and token investors in securities matters. "

Following its launch on Wednesday, the HAWK coin quickly hit a market capitalization of nearly \$500 million, according to Forbes. But within 20 minutes, the coin's value completely tanked and plummeted from as much as \$490 million to just \$41 million.

However, billionaire investor Mark Cuban recently defended her, saying, "It wasn't something she fully understood." "But she trusted the people around her," the Shark Tank star added during a podcast with The Washington Post's Jules Terpak.
