"Instead of enforcing arbitrary 'old-school' rules or what is 'right' and 'wrong,' etiquette is about following guidelines that lead to greater respect, cooperation and understanding."

As long as your clothing is appropriate for the weather, wear whatever colors and patterns you like, she says. "Depending on your climate, the fabric is the one thing that should be changed, not the color," she adds.

Back in the days, you'd be laughed (or shouted) out of the office if you showed up in jeans and a T-shirt. For decades, business etiquette dictated that men wear collared shirts (sans wrinkles, of course!) and slacks. Women stuck to dresses, naturally. Even just a decade ago, most companies expected workers to show up in crisp button-downs and slacks.

Etiquette isn't about old-fashioned politeness or outdated rules about opening doors and folding napkins (and it's not always common sense). At its core, good etiquette is the oil that keeps society running smoothly. "What we call 'good manners' are really a list of agreed-upon social rules that let everyone know what to expect when interacting with others," says Valerie Sokolosky, an etiquette expert and the author of *Do It Right!*, a comprehensive guide to modern etiquette. "Knowing these ground rules of good manners isn't just about being polite—it's about how to be kind and gracious in every situation."

15 RULES EVERY GOLFER SHOULD KNOW

The rules of golf as approved by the USGA and R&A Rules Limited, effective January 2023.

<p>BALL MOVED</p> <p>1 Ball Moved During Search</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If you move your partner's ball (or your own) while searching for it, there is no penalty. Just replace the ball. <p>2 Ball Moved on Putting Green</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If you accidentally move your partner's ball (or your own) on the putting green, there is no penalty. Just replace the ball. Once you've lifted and replaced your ball on the putting green, your ball is now "marked." Stroke-and-Distance (not a penalty): Drop your ball where you last played it, but not closer to the hole than the spot where you last played it. Golf carts are a great way to enjoy the game. However, it is important to know any rules governing their usage. Depending on the weather and conditions, you may only be able to drive them on the designated cart path. This is true for winter golf or when the ground is wet, as it prevents damage and erosion to the course. Additionally, certain holes, such as the first, ninth, and eighteenth holes, seen from the parking lot or outside the course, will usually have a cart path rule in place. This is done to maintain a good impression by visitors and potential customers.
